Dear Patrons, Friends & Well-wishers,

At the end of another working year, it is time to look back and reflect on the happiness, the heartaches and the difficulties we go through this because of the nature of the work we do. Our work for the last year has been nothing less than hectic, but every case we have dealt with, has been a reward in itself. Our four Centres have been carrying out the Animal Birth Control (ABC) program with great efficiency, month after month, for the last 21 years of our existence. Despite this, puppies are seen here and there, leading to dangerous consequences for all members of these small families. We have realised that there is large-scale ignorance on this issue among sections of society. We are now doubling our efforts to get this important message across as it is lifesaving for the animals involved and contributes in many relevant ways to public health and safety.

India is one of the few proud countries in the world that has many laws to protect

animals. Our stray dogs have been granted lease of life – all we have to do is to see that they are spayed / neutered and vaccinated. Our Constitution exhorts each citizen to protect animals and see that they are not harmed. The world over, people who work for animals are now encouraging mankind to be aware of the Five Freedoms that all animals should enjoy – just as humans enjoy them, all pertaining to a comfortable, safe, healthy and happy life.

As for us at **IDA India**, the words of Abraham Lincoln echo in all our hearts, “I am in favour of animal rights as well as human rights. That is the way of a whole human being.” It is our serious endeavour to reach out to all, wherever they are, and guide and advise people to extend rights to the living beings who share this earth with us. The last 21 years though eventful and challenging, have helped us reach out to thousands of homeless animals. Our major projects are:

- ✓ Four centres at (i) Deonar in Mumbai, (ii) Turbhe in Navi Mumbai, (iii) New Panvel in CIDCO region and (iv) Lonavala in Khandala-Lonavala region.
- ✓ Animal Birth Control (ABC) program for 1150 street dogs per month (300 in Mumbai, 400 in Navi Mumbai, 400 in CIDCO region, & 50 in Lonavala.)
- ✓ ABC program for street cats 100 per month at Mumbai.
- ✓ 160 other life saving surgeries per month not limited to hernia, haematoma, VG, prolapsed organs, wound suturing, etc.
- ✓ Treatment to around 400 per month seriously ill / injured dogs & cats brought in by our ambulances from nook and corners of the four regions.
- ✓ Ambulance Service: 12 ambulances, including 4 big vans and 8 small vans.
- ✓ Spot Treatment to 250 dogs & cats per month for minor ailments on the road itself through Mobile Clinics, in Eastern Suburbs of Mumbai, and 24x7 services in Navi Mumbai.
- ✓ Shelter to around 44 blind dogs, and 35 handicapped dogs and cats, that cannot fend for themselves on the road. The blind dogs are housed in an exclusive ward opening into a beautiful garden.
- ✓ Compassionate Children's Club for school children to sensitize them about kindness & compassion.

Employees:

IDA India employs a staff of 98 persons including visiting Surgeons, qualified veterinarians, para-vets, centre managers, supervisors, ambulance drivers, dog catchers, ward boys and administrative office staff, and it is this team that enables us to help so many animals. Management by Office Bearers is on honorary basis.

Important Milestones:

- Deonar Centre started from 1st February 2000
- Vashi Centre started from 26th July 2006 & closed on 1st September 2010. It was restarted at Turbhe from 18th May 2011 after 9 months.
- Neral Centre for horses operated between 28th August 2006 & 1st July 2011.
- Mobile Clinics started in May 2005.
- Large animal Project in Mumbai operated between April 2007 & April 2011.
- CIDCO Centre at New Panvel started from 21st December 2012
- Lonavala Centre started from 8th March 2013.

Challenges:

A glimpse at **IDA India**'s financials and the pie chart on the back cover show that our funding is mainly dependent on donations, but neither a fixed source of income nor a Corpus to fund the activities. We could do this for 21 years, but time has come to strengthen our financials. You, our patrons can do this by monthly support or by donating towards our Corpus.

Dog Sterilization:

Dog sterilization goes on regularly in Mumbai & Navi Mumbai, but there has been a shift in gear at Panvel. Having covered nodes in Panvel regions, we are now going out to distant nodes beyond Panvel where the program is yet to reach. Our focus is Ulwe where construction of the new International Airport is in full swing. Once the airport becomes operational, stray dogs could be an issue. Our endeavour is to bring down birth of puppies in the region.



Clinical surgeries:

Specialised major surgeries with special post-op care are performed, e.g. Hernia, hematoma, amputation, venereal growth, tumour, cancer of the penis, extraction of damaged eye, digit or tooth; prolapse of organs like uterus, rectum, urinary bladder; and wound suturing. This endeavour helps animals to return to a normal life on the streets.

Treatment:

OPD, Mobile Clinics for spot treatment & admission of critical cases goes on in full swing. **IDA India** covers huge tracts of land from Sion to Mulund / Mankhurd in Mumbai, entire Navi Mumbai spread over 162 sq. km, New Panvel and now beyond. **IDA India**'s outreach now covers more than 300 sq. km. area.

Cat Sterilization & treatment:

IDA India started cat sterilization way back in 2003, added infrastructure to house spay/neuter cats and treatment cases separately. Now our cat work has legal sanctity, as Animal Welfare Board of India has recently given an advisory to Municipal bodies to include cats in the Animal Birth Control program.



Adoptions:

Finding good homes for dogs and cats has been our constant endeavour. This year our adoptees included 5 blind cats & 2 Pomeranians.

Blind Dogs & Cats at Deonar Centre:

We have in our care blind dogs and cats, mostly blind due to aging. Few young blind are sent to a veterinary ophthalmologist. The good news is that with cataract surgeries, dog **Bella** got her sight back in one eye, and cat **Roshni** got partial vision in both eyes. This endeavour continues.

A garden for the Blind Dogs:

We developed a lovely garden for our blind dogs to stroll around, stretch their legs under the blue skies and smell the grass. It has a walking track, red tile walkway, grassy lawn, flowering plants, benches and even pergola. We have put up a Memory Wall where families can put up 'bricks' in memory of their much loved departed pets.



When the garden was ready, we had a grand opening of sorts! We simply opened the gates! One never saw a lovelier sight. Our blind dogs slowly made their way up a short flight of steps searching with their very efficient noses, to smell something very exciting – fresh grass,

and exploring the wide open spaces before them. That was the only time they were tentative in their approach! Now they crowd near their small gate waiting for it to open and rush into the garden for their morning exercise. This garden is also used for rehab of sighted dogs and cats recovering from spinal or limb injuries. (pictures of the garden on inside back cover)

This year too, nearly 250 people participated, some with their dogs. As is her practice, she remits the entire collection to **IDA India**, while all expenses of the event are borne by her personally, be it T-shirts, awards, fees of the Timing Company, refreshments or any other. Volunteers:

Volunteers have always been an essential part for a NGO, especially in the field of animal welfare, and those interested can apply online. Our e-mag Volunteer Voice keeps them updated about our work, our needs and also helps them understand matters pertaining to animal welfare.

Volunteers in and around Mumbai, can come to Deonar Centre to help with hands down work in the areas that require attention. Besides volunteers, Internship has been a latest addition to our workforce. Each Volunteer/Intern is valuable and we are glad that they set aside a part of their time just to help us with our animals.

Compassionate Children's Club:

This is an online club for children in the age group of 8 to 15. Membership is free and each child who joins receives an exciting Gift Pack. Among other things, it contains a small Kindness Guide, colourful and educational, based on the Five Freedoms that each animal in this world should enjoy. After our experience and interactions with these precious and sensitive minds, we believe that they think of many ways of helping our animal friends. Amongst many examples, one of the kids sent her 'birthday money' for animals in our care, while others made small bracelets, cards, cupcakes and sold them to raise much needed funds for us. A brother and sister duo in Australia with their friends, grow Rosemary in their garden, make little packets of the herb and sell them in the local Mall informing customers that the proceeds will help animals in India.

Each child receives an E-Mag, which contains articles, poems, drawings and entries for our competitions sent in by the children themselves. We find each child amazing with the promise of potential. For details write to info@idaindia.org

Funds:

Municipal Corporations that supported us in spay/neuter (Dog Animal Birth Control) program during the year:

- Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai (MCGM) supports @ Rs. 600 per dog brought by Municipal Vans and @ Rs. 900 per dog brought by **IDA India** ambulances.
- Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation (NMMC) renders support that covers staff salaries and reimburses costs @ Rs. 400 per dog for spay/neuter and treatment and additional Rs. 130 for catching/releasing. With this support **IDA India** is able to render 24x7 service for animals in Navi Mumbai.
- CIDCO supports @ Rs. 550 per dog. From this meager amount, we even have to pay for water and electricity, which is usually provided free by Municipal Corporations.
- Lonavala Municipal Council has provided us place to carry on with our work, but they do not provide any monetary support.

Our donors:

I walked out of the operation theatre to see Farzana in the waiting room with her Inshy and smiled. Farzana always brings a smile to my face. As usual she was busy chatting with the other parents waiting their turn with their pets - some anxious, some downright depressed because of their pet's illness. "You've got a senior citizens forum here Sangeeta" Farzana said and rightly, there were patients from 7 years to 17 years. When Farzana came in, she showed me a lump on Inshys flank. "I cancelled my meetings and came to see you the minute I saw this", she said, adding, "I know about tumours, I didn't want to wait around and watch."

I silently wished all pet parents were well informed and proactive like this while checking the lump. "This is a local tissue reaction to a vaccine, nothing to worry about. It will go away on its own slowly." I said. "Ok great - how do you find her otherwise? I want to bring her for a complete check-up. She is 7 years old now. And tell me what I should be doing to keep her healthy and comfortable from now on."

Like Farzana, many parents are concerned about the geriatric health care of their pets. Unlike the past, not many guardians accept symptoms of ill health, as normal part of ageing, which is a phase of life and not a disease. Pets today, live longer and better quality lives than ever before. This is because of improved nutrition, veterinary care and educated parents. Understanding the aging process and the most common problems that face the geriatric dog is the first step in providing the best possible care to your older animal.

The basic focus of geriatric health care is owner education and the early detection and prevention of any disease. What happens as we (and our pets) age? There is a gradual decline in metabolism and the body's ability to maintain and repair itself. Because of this, weight gain is a common problem as one's pet slows down. There is also a gradual decline in senses and your pet may not be as quick to react or respond. So what can one do to make sure they optimise their senior pet's health?

Start with nutrition- A proper diet is very important in the care of an ageing dog. However, there is no best food to feed a geriatric dog; the best food depends on the specific problems or nutritional requirements of the individual animal. Most foods for older dogs are lower in protein, sodium and phosphorus to help their ageing hearts and kidneys. Increased amounts of certain vitamins have also been found to be beneficial in the senior dog. Your vet will advise you on your pet's diet depending

on his/ her health status. Your vet will recommend food that is high in fibre and lower in fat, so that your dog is eating his accustomed amount of food, but fewer calories. As digestion worsens, he might do better with smaller, more frequent meals. Conditions such as diabetes, arthritis, heart or liver problems also call for special nutritional plans.

Visit your veterinarian frequently. Most vets recommend a check-up once every 6 months when your dog reaches his senior years. Blood tests, X-rays, ultrasound, electrocardiograms, CT scans or MRIs might be necessary. Be prepared to tell your vet about any changes in your pet's stamina, appetite or behaviour, when it began and what might have triggered it. A geriatric check-up includes a complete examination to check for cataract, heart disease, arthritis, and other problems associated with age.

Ensure regular grooming- you will be able to catch tumours early, and regular brushing of teeth will keep gum disease at bay, as well as allow you to check for any change in the usual 'doggy breath'.

Keep your senior pet active- The old adage "use it or lose it" is as true for dogs as it is for humans. Gentle exercise helps your dog maintain muscle tone, keeps his heart and digestion healthy and even improves his attitude. Give him more frequent "bathroom" breaks. His digestion may be irregular and his bladder may lose elasticity and capacity. Stick to a regular schedule. Your dog always liked a routine; he'll appreciate it more now. Feed him and walk him at the same times each day.

Minimise stress. As he ages, even the most social dog may not welcome strange animals or people, or even tolerate familiar children. Due to his failing senses, arthritis or forgetfulness, your dog may shy away from previously welcomed travel or other social situations. Help Your Dog Eat and Sleep Comfortably Give him a soft bed. Arthritis, elbow calluses and other conditions will make it harder for your dog to sleep soundly. Always provide fresh, cool water. This is a good policy for all ages, but especially important for an older dog to keep the kidneys in good condition.

And cherish each day you have with your special companion. Knowing they are loved and cared for will be more important than anything else to help your pet live a long and healthy life.

Educational Workshop on animal welfare by IDA India At St. Xavier's High School, Mira Road on 27th August 2018

IDA India conducted an animal welfare workshop at St. Xavier's High School. The main objective was to show how animals are to be treated, problems they face and how they can make their lives happier and healthier. Kids love animals but do not know how to behave when they are around. Since animal welfare is not in most schools' curriculum, **IDA India** took the initiative of enlightening the students on how to be safe around animals and to keep them safe. Our three volunteers, **Sancheta Rawat, Yashika Panwar & Pankaj Panwar** conducted the workshop.

They briefed them about **IDA India** and our purpose. To make them comfortable, children were asked about their pets, if any, and that broke the ice for most. Some kids asked questions about **IDA India** and how it takes care of animals and reaches out to those in need. They were efficiently replied to by the team.

The young audience was explained about the basic necessities of animals and why it is important that they enjoy these rights / freedoms. Some of the necessities were answered by the students themselves. We asked whether animals around us enjoy the rights/freedom, to which they said 'no'. Some kids said people treat animals badly, some said we humans take away their homes by cutting forests and thus the discussion continued.

We asked them how they behave around animals to which few said we run away. We explained why it is wrong to run and what can happen if they do. Thereafter we enacted how to behave around a stray animal. We asked few of them to do it for us, and awarded them with **IDA India** gifts.

We talked about what they do for animals, to which they simply answered 'we give them water, biscuits and rotis'. We asked them about environment, how it is changing, and what effect it has on animals. It was very interactive and kids were very intelligent.

We played a few games to keep them entertained. We distributed sheets with games

like determining the population of dogs, determining whether animals are happy and so on. A jigsaw was given to them and few groups solved it. Prizes were given to every student who answered our questions and won in the games. After which we gave out phone number and e-mail address of **IDA India**. Three kids gave speech on animals, about how beautiful they are, their nature and diet. At the end of the session all the students took oath to take care of animals, not to harm them, rather help them in every way possible. We asked them about how the session went to which they happily answered that they enjoyed the session. We distributed thank you cards and certificates to all of them.

Overall, it was a very enthusiastic, energetic and interactive session. Students were very much involved and interested. They were keen to learn more. Our volunteers enjoyed the session too. The primary objective of conducting the session was achieved and it was a success!

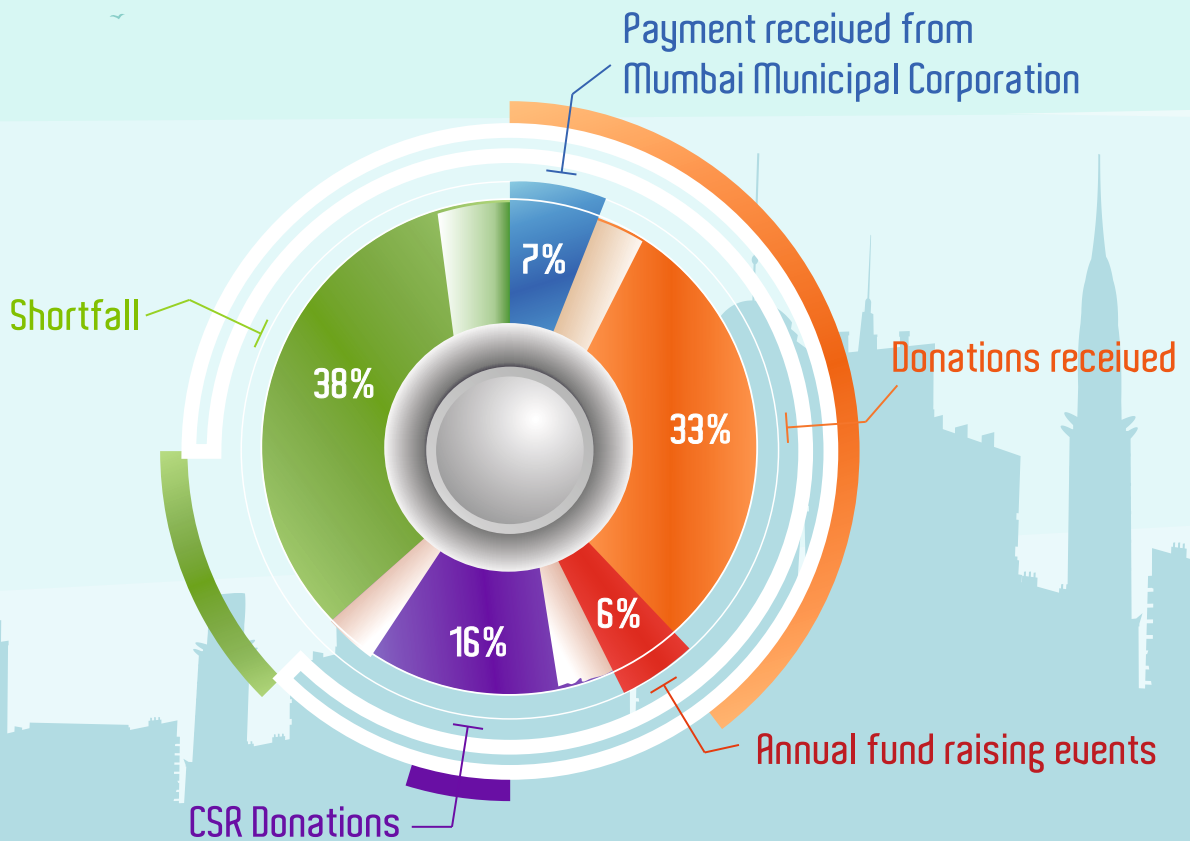
